First, plans are in full steam by AREVA Newport News LLC, a partnership between AREVA and Northrop Grumman, for a new heavy component manufacturing facility to be located in the shipyard's North Parking area. This facility will become a 330,000 square foot facility that is expected to be operational in January 2012. Chris Levesque, President of the LLC, and his team, along with Newport News City officials have invited all residents to an informational meeting and open discussion regarding construction plans for the facility and what it means for our community.

We will be decorating the park on Saturday, December 5th from 1 to 4 pm. If you would like to assist us in this effort, feel free to come by for an hour or whatever time you can spare. As in years past, we will have cookies and apple cider on hand for our volunteers.

Behind the trees and other vegetation, the Shipyard was expanding the parking lot in preparation for another project. The Shipyard wanted to expand into other enterprises which would fit into the existing capabilities at the Yard. In order to provide space for a new facility, the Shipyard decided to consolidate available parking by eliminating part of the parking facilities at the North Yard and expand the parking lot at 50th Street.

During the course of discussing the 50th Street parking lot expansion, it became obvious that neither the Shipyard nor the City Officials involved had considered the potential impact that a change in traffic patterns may have had on our neighborhood.

Besides expanding the 50th Street parking lot, the Shipyard modified the exit points by adding an exit at 57th Street. This had the potential of creating a potentially heavy traffic pattern at unspecified times right in the middle of our neighborhood.

The Board took action by formulating what our goals were as a neighborhood and developing an action plan and finally presenting the plan to the appropriate City Officials. Over the course of several meetings, the Board gathered information from the shipyard, the City as well as other sources. There was also an open meeting for the general membership to offer their input as well. The action plan was shaped by the concerns presented and how they could be addressed in a practical manner. The plan

was presented at a meeting with City officials and our political representative. Both the short term actions as well as the long term actions were adopted.

While everything seems to have turned out for best for all of the interested parties, the future is never guaranteed. You as members need to keep a watchful eye on what goes on in and around our neighborhood. No one who serves on our NEHHPA Board has any more time than the rest of us nor any special connections to the City or the Shipyard. That is why it is so important for everyone to be vigilant and pass on information that the Board might need to act in our best interests. You may be in a better position to know or discover important facts so please never assume that what you know is common knowledge to the rest of the members and the Board. In this age of computers it is easy to communicate quickly, but it is still vitally important to insure that good decisions are made in the first place. That can't be done with having quality information to base those decisions on and that is why your participation as members is so important.

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UPCOMING MEMBERSHIP MEETING WITH CITY AND SHIPYARD

On Wednesday, November 18, 2009, at 7 pm, the residents of the North End / Huntington Heights neighborhood are invited to a meeting with AREVA Newport News, LLC, a partnership between AREVA and Northrop Grumman and with representatives of the City of Newport News in the Newport News City Council Chambers at 2400 Washington Avenue.

AREVA Newport News will be discussing their new heavy component manufacturing facility in the shipyard's North Parking area. The facility will be a 330,000 square foot facility that is expected to become operational in January 2012.

Chris Levesque , President of AREVA Newport News, LLC and his team, along with Newport News City officials are presenting an informational meeting and open discussion regarding construction plans for the facility and what it means for our community.

The upcoming phase of construction involves driving concrete pilings 75 to 100 feet into the ground to create a stable foundation for the flooring and structure of the facility. These pipings will begin to be installed the week of November 16, 2009. The work will generally be performed between the hours of 7 am and 5:30 pm Monday through Saturday.

The NEHHPA board encourages you to attend this meeting so that you will have an opportunity to address any concerns you may have regarding this facility and its construction.

Over the Back Fence:

Preserving Your Wallet during the Tax Season

While taxes are almost always on everyone's list of hot button issues, there are ways to lessen one's tax burden while also working to preserve one's home. There are three groups of tax credits. First are those associated with rehabilitation tax credits. Next, there are new acquisition tax credits. Lastly, there are energy tax credits. The following guidance is not intended as legal advice, and you should consult a tax professional with specific questions.

The federal government provides the Federal Historic Preservation Tax Incentives program. The program encourages private sector rehabilitation of historic buildings and is one of the nation's most successful and cost-effective community revitalization programs. Unfortunately it is difficult for the average homeowner to take advantage of the benefits of the program. Virginia offers the **Virginia State Rehabilitation Tax Credit**. State tax credits are available for owner-occupied, as well as income-producing buildings. If your property is income-producing, you may also be able to take advantage of the aforementioned [federal tax credits](#). The state tax credit is more within reach of the average homeowner and additional information can be obtained at www.dhr.virginia.gov/tax_credits/tax_credit_faqs.htm. The City of Newport News offers a property tax

abatement program for those who invest in home rehabilitation. The program information can be found at The City's website. www.nngov.com/development/downloads/incentives/resrehabfactsheet.pdf

This year several new acquisition tax credit programs were created. While they are not aimed at home preservation per se, they are nevertheless useful. The first time homebuyers program first created in 2008 and continued into 2009 are useful in acquiring a historic home. The credit applies only to homes used as a taxpayer's principal residence. It reduces a taxpayer's tax bill or increases his or her refund, dollar for dollar and is fully refundable, meaning the credit will be paid out to eligible taxpayers, even if they owe no tax or the credit is more than the tax owed. However there are differences in the programs. For homes purchased in 2008, the credit is similar to a no-interest loan and must be repaid in 15 equal, annual installments beginning with the 2010 income tax year. For home purchased in 2009, the credit does not have to be paid back unless the home ceases to be the taxpayer's main residence within a three-year period following the purchase. Probably the most useful and available tax credits are those associated with energy savings. Typical home maintenance and preservation items such as storm windows, storm doors, weatherstripping. These items as well as high efficiency appliances are some of the products available for a direct tax credit. These tax credits are limited to the purchase of the products and do not cover installation charges. The total energy tax credit is limited to \$1500 and extends to purchases made throughout 2009 and 2010. As with any other tax credits, receipts should be saved for documentation.
